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Potsdam conference: a resounding success

All in all, the 18th Annual Conference of CIRCOM regional, which took place from 30 May to 2 June 2000 in Potsdam, Germany, can be seen as a resounding success. The figures speak for themselves.

Lasting four days, it was the longest annual meeting in the association's history; 316 participants attended from 32 countries, more than ever before. We saw the longest ever training seminar at two weeks, with 56 participants, trainees and tutors, more than ever before. A total of 126 entries were submitted for the PRIX CIRCOM for the best production by a regional television station: another record.

Much was new at the first CIRCOM conference in the new millennium: artists from three European countries exhibited their work in the foyer of the conference centre Bulgarian sculptor Alexander Proinov, who has created the beautiful PRIX CIRCOM trophy; Italian painter Antonio Masini from Potenza / Basilicata; and a group of Slovenian artists from the School of the Arts in Lubljana. Through their work they managed to convey a homely, soothing atmosphere in an otherwise modern, technically austere conference building of glass, steel and concrete.

The presentation of works of art alongside the Annual Conference was an experiment which will be continued in the future, possibly as soon as the conference in Porto in 2001, where it is intended to present the work of artists from five European regions from all points of the European compass, Northern, Southern, Eastern, Western and Central Europe under the slogan "acor art compass of regions". Such a project requires early planning, competent organisation and suitable exhibition rooms, for which Potsdam will hopefully serve as a forerunner.

CR History

Equally deserving of future continuance was the impressive presentation of CIRCOM's history made in Potsdam for the first time by Marie-Paule Urban with such painstaking attention to detail, which awoke the interest and appreciation of all delegates. Marie-Paule Urban, CIRCOM·s deputy secretary general placed at France 3 in Strassbourg put together a hitherto neglected documentation.

To return to the conference itself. The concept of thinking the second thought, developed as far back as the summer of last year, was followed through consistently: the conference presented itself to the public, to external experts who made an immense contribution to our daily work and who offered a glimpse into the future development of regional television.

Each of the four conference days had its own slogan another first, albeit not unproblematic, at least from the organisational point of view.

Andreas Weiss, co-ordinator of ARD·s foreign programmes, prepared and chaired a discussion on the future of regional television in the age of digital technology, a debate whose participants included, amongst others, Professor Jeffrey Cole from the Center for Communication Policy, Los Angeles; Professor Joe Groebel from European Institute of Media, Düsseldorf; and Allen Bird, from the management consultancy Booz, Allen & Hamilton, New York / Munich.

The future of public service broadcasting

The future of public service broadcasting was debated by, amonthst others, former German Federal Constitutional Court judge Professor Dieter Grimm, EBU legal expert Dr. Horst Rumphorst, Polish television director Carel Jakubowicz and Boris Bergant, CIRCOMs Secretary General.

Silvia Halm, from Catalonian Television in Barcelona, put together a workshop to discuss the interplay between regional identity and regional television reporting. This hearing chaired by Ellen Hazelkorn of the Institute of Technologies, Dublin, got high attention by the conference participants who asked for continuing the discussion at one of the next Annual Conferences.

Methods and goals of future journalistic training provided the topic for day two, presented by representatives of European television academies, schools for journalism and corporate universities of international companies such as Bertelsmann, represented by Ulrike Bentlage. The outlook for TV-journalism in general: there will be a multi-skilled person, a researcher, a reporter, a technician, a cutter, a broadcaster, a programme-manager altogether in one person who has to qualify himself the whole time of his professional life.

South-eastern Europe

Day three was dedicated to the development of democratic media in the regions of Southeastern Europe, independent of state intervention. The current media landscape in all Southeastern European region was presented in detail, a subject what has been prepared and moderated by Dusan Rfeljic from the European Institute of Media in Düsseldorf/Germany. The training seminar

The participants in this years training seminar for young TVjournalists, under the excellent direction of Rick Thompson and his colleagues, formed a focal point in this conference, more so than in previous years. This was mainly due to the news show "Today and Tomorrow", produced by the trainees every day. Through this work, the trainees were fully integrated into conference events, and

The Potsdam Conference 2000 was a success, because of new quantities achieved, but also because of the contemporary topics on offer. Last but not least: it provided an opportunity to renew old acmet its goal and proved to be extremely useful. A whole series of projects were presented, intensive cooperation was agreed, in particular with regard to intensivy exchange of information, the organisation of joint training seminars, project-related cooperation with ingard to long-term sponsorship agreements. In this respect the Potsdam Conference will have a lasting, successful effect on the work of our association.

Good and bad moments

Like all previous conferences, the meeting in Potsdam had its good and its bad moments, moments in which things did not go quite as they were expected to do and indeed could have done. But, upon reflection: the end result was positive, if the reactions and feedback received so far are anything to go by. For the first time in CIRCOMs history, the organisation of the Annual Conference remained the sole responsibility of our association. This was an extremely problematic situation which placed an unreasonable burden, and which should not happen again as President R. Allerdt said. The Potsdam Conference 2000, in the extensive "Ostdeutsche Sparkassen Akademie" was in many respects a new form of CIRCOM Annual Conference; it was an experiment, of whose success each conference delegate must decide for himself. What remains under the line that is the question to be answered. Potsdam Conference 2000 already is a part of the past. Now it is the time to look forward to 2001, to the next Annual Conference, when we will be the guests of Portuguese Television in Porto. Already we can begin to look forward to meeting friends and colleagues there.

But time is slipping away: even before the conference in Porto, we need to know by November 2000 which of our member stations is prepared to take over the honorary role of hosting a jubilee conference in 2002, the 20th Annual Conference of CIRCOM regional.

A possible dialogue? is the theme of an int l meeting between TV channel programme managers and Mediterranean Producers and Directors to be held in Marseilles, June 22-23. The meeting organized by CMCA, Conseil General des BdR and Co.Pe.A.M. is a result of Coproduction Working Group at the 6th Co.Pe. A.M. Conference (Valencia-March 1999).

The organization of a specific meeting for Euro-Mediterranean channel programme managers and broadcasting professionals must meet an often-expressed need: bringing together and aligning the reciprocal interests of broadcasters and producers in terms of programmes.

The event takes place at the same time as two major broadcasting events (The Sunny Side of the Docs and The Int l Doc umentary Festival).

The Marseilles meeting should provide a forum for aligning the often

divergent viewpoints of TV channel programming managers and programme producers and directors as a whole.

This encounter cannot be productive unless it truly creates a realistic context in which channel managers and their external contact can come together.

The event has a twofold objective. Firstly, as well as opposing different points of view, it aims to reach a consensus whereby each party is better able to perceive respective expectations, imperatives and requirements.

It includes an introduction to Potsdam and the Circom 18th Annual Conference, then a report on the Training Workshop which includes one of the full programmes recorded by the trainees - "Brandenburg Tonight". The video report is presented by one of the young journalists, Gisela Machado, from Porto in Portugal, which will be the venue for next year's conference. EbS will transmit the programme three times in its "Campus" slot, which covers European training initiatives. Entries and application form must be submitted before noon October 2. Reports must be made between October 1, 1999 and October 1, 2000. Duration of the programs on Betacam Pal is 60 minutes maximum. Entries must be in Catalan, Spanish or English. Programs in another language have to be either dubbed or subtitled. Each station may enter three programs.

Public broadcasting must remain accessible says EBU Prez A. Scharf

The role of Public Broadcasting in the digital era was • the subject of the opening keynote address of EBU s President Albert Scharf at the CIRCOM Regionals conference in Potsdam. May 30.

One of the threats to Public Broadcasting s future - said Mr. Scharf - would be to cut it off from new technologies. And throughout the history of Public Broadcasting in Europe once and again until these very days there were attempts undertaken to limit Public Broadcasting to pre-existing means of would have happened if Public Broadcasters would have been waves, to change from black and white TV to colour or to use satellite and cable distribution?

But: all those attempts failed. A strong public opinion and wise political judgement always fought for this unique media concept, for massmedia, responsible to the general public rather than dependent on shareholders private interests. The most recent example of this fundamental point of view is a resolution of the European Union's Council of Ministers of last year, where the supreme governing body of the EU noted and reaffirmed

- that the fulfilment of the Public Service Broadcasting s mission must continue to benefit from technological progress:
- that broad public access, without discrimination and on the basis of equal opportunities, to various channels and services is a necessary precondition for fulfilling the special over Europe. obligation of Public Service Broadcasting;
- bringing to the public the benefits of the new audiovisual and information services and the new technologies;
- that the ability of Public Service Broadcasting to offer quality programming and services to the public must be diversification of activities in the digital age;
- that Public Broadcasting must be able to continue to provide a wide range of programming in accordance with its

remit as defined by the Member States in order to address society as a whole; in this context it is legitimate for Public Service Broadcasting to seek to reach wide audiences.

In these few sentences all the support is expressed we need to play our role: participation in new technologies as well as structural authorisation to new services and their appropriate financing and the recognition that we must strive for massappeal too, not being limited to esoteric minority programming, to highbrow elitist programme which commercially do not sell. Serving regional audiences and interesting distant audiences that Public Service Broadcasting has an important role in for regional concerns or beauties all around in Europe is part of the Public Service Remit in Broadcasting. And it is a promising challenge and a great chance for Public Broadcasting just now in this moment of communication history: to ensure people on their individual existence, future and human integrity, giving them the maintained end enhanced, including the development and feeling that they count as members of the society they live in, not just as buying consumers, not just as objects of global marketing strategies. Europes finest young musicians representing the 15 countries of the European Union on September 20 will fill the air of the Paul Henri Spaak Building of the European Parliament in Brussels with the sounds of music, where normally the differing languages of the various political groups are heard.

The European Union Youth Orchestra dressed in the blue and yellow of Europe, will give a gala concert in celebration of the new President of the European Parliament at 8pm in the Salle Polyvalente of the Paul Henri Spaak Building. The renowned young Russian conductor Yakov Kreizberg will lead the orchestra in a performance of the most dazzling jewels of European classical music.

Why is the concert taking place?

This musical tribute to Mme Nicole Fontaine will celebrate her Presidency of the European Parliament as well as of the Orchestra. It has been a tradition since 1982 that the President of the Parliament is also the President of the European Union Youth Orchestra. The concert will also bring the unrivalled work of the EUYO into the heart of the Parliament which, with the European Commission, sustains the Orchestra with a substantial annual grant.

Following its concert, the orchestra will travel to Hannover, to give a groundbreaking arena concert for the World Expo s Honour Day for the European Union.

What is the European Union Youth Orchestra?

The European Union Youth Orchestra, a symbol of perfect harmony, is the European Union s cultural flagship and under its Founding Music Director Claudio Abbado and its present Music Director Vladimir Ashkenazy is considered to be one of the worlds leading orchestras. World famous guest conductors have worked with the Orchestra including its Honorary Music Director, Bernard Haitink, Daniel Barenboim, Leonard Bernstein, Sir Colin Davis, Carlo Maria Giulini, Herbert von Karajan, Zubin Mehta, Mstislav Rostropovich and Sir Georg Solti KBE. Soloists have included Martha Argerich, Lord Menuhin and Jessye Norman.

The main purpose of establishing the orchestra was to demonstrate through music the co-operation and unity of European youth, thereby setting an example as a symbol of the European ideal. As Ambassadors of Goodwill from Europe, the orchestra has toured Mexico, China, Hong Kong, Japan, North and South America, India, Eastern Europe, Russia and the Baltic States.

The orchestra s greatest success has been as a high quality training ground for young musicians entering the profession. Over 4,000 apply to play in the orchestra each year. A survey has shown that 96% of all the musicians who have passed through the orchestra are performing either as soloists or as members of orchestras throughout the world. Many young musicians have been able to graduate from the EUYO straight to orchestras such as the London Symphony Orchestra, the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra and the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra. Many successful ensembles and chamber orchestras have also been established by former members of the EUYO.The EUYO has won numerous prizes, notably the Olympia Prize of the Alexander S Onassis Public Benefit Foundation in recognition of its notable contribution to the preservation of our European cultural inheritance, the first ever "Prix d'Initiative Europenne" and the "European Media Prize". Both prizes were for the Orchestra's extraordinary contribution to the development of cultural cooperation and unity within the European Union. Further international recognition came with the awarding of the European Union medal to the Orchestra s Secretary-General and Co-Founder, Mrs Joy Bryer, by former President Gil-Robls.

The orchestra's Patrons are the Prime Ministers of each of the fifteen member countries of the European Union. The EUYO is financed annually by a generous grant of scholarships to the young musicians in member countries voted by the Parliament and administered by the Commission of the European



Union, by annual contributions from the fifteen member governments of the European Union and from private sector sponsorship.
